#### SMALL WONDERS PLAYGROUP

A free early years program for children and their parents/carers. Thursday mornings during school term 9:00 - 10:30 am in the Kindergarten room.



**Cybersafety** is an important issue both for schools and families. It is important that parents engage and show an interest in what their children get up to with devices and that rules and restrictions around use are enforced. Below are 10 tips that may help with cybersafety at home.

**Ban devices in bedrooms:** Prevent your children from going to their rooms with a device. Make them use them in the lounge or kitchen and keep the charger in a central area such as the kitchen. You can also use this charging time to check texts, social media posts and emails.

**Set time limits:** For smaller children, this may be for up to 30 minutes a day or only on the weekends. Also decide each night to turn off devices and a time when they are allowed on again.

**Create passwords:** Make sure you know the passwords for all of their devices and various social media accounts. Also, follow your children's accounts so you can see what they are posting but maybe promise not to post anything on their accounts so you don't embarrass them.

**Regular checks:** Let them know that you'll occasionally check their texts, emails, posts, photos and settings. Explain that it's not spying, you're just teaching them to be responsible.

**Get it in writing:** Consider drawing up a contract between yourself and your child outlining the dos and don'ts. Include consequences for rule violations.

**Teach consequences:** Talk to your children regularly about the dangers of constantly accessing the internet and posting on their social pages. Tell them never to post anything they wouldn't want their parents or teachers to see.

**Teach yourself:** The best way to know what your children are capable of is to know how to use these devices and websites yourself.

**Cyberbullying:** Keep a very close eye on any evidence of cyberbullying. If you suspect something, talk to your child first. Also, take screenshots as evidence for police and school.

**Limit apps:** If you have an iTunes or Google Play account, keep the password private so you limit what they buy. Get them to ask permission for each app download.

**Online manners:** Make sure they understand the consequences if they are unpleasant to anyone online.



Disasters and the impact they have upon us. The class have thrassed words, written and researched topics, made papiermâché volcanos and read as much as we can about major natural disasters that have happened around the world. Some of the natural disasters or volcanoes that Year 6 found of particular interest were, the destruction of Krakatoa, Indonesia, the recent activity of Mt Etna in Sicily (an active volcano), and the Beauty of Mount Fuji, Japan. Year 6 W wanted to express their knowledge of their research also within the creative arts and have produced some magnificent pieces of artwork that depict Mt Etna (water colours), Mt Fuji (coloured pencil), and also a ferocious volcano like Krakatoa (in oil pastels). The Year 9 Technology Class got together in small groups and spent nearly 4 months building and painting three canoes. They are designed to be paddled by a single person and are based on the legendary design by Mike O'Brien. The canoes are constructed from two sheets of 5mm marine ply with treated pine chines and stems. The seams were all glued with epoxy and fibreglassed and the boat then painted with Norglass Marine paint. The materials for each boat cost \$300. With the sale of the boats, the students hope to cover the cost of the materials and perhaps a little extra to help fund their final projects.

Yesterday we had a brilliant test run to float the boats at Kingston Beach. It's fair to say the boats exceeded expectations and handled beautifully. It was a fitting end to an awesome project by these students.
